No matter what the email is saying, no board member of the club will ever ask you to buy gift cards or provide personal information you haven't provided with your membership.

As a general rule, never click on an included link in an email or provide information to a call. If your bank needs information, call them directly or open your browser and go to their direct web site. Many scammers have very convincing screens. Even if you know how to check the URL address, it is best to just never click on the provided link.

Technical Talk

Model A Tech

Interesting info from Secrets Magazine sent in by Mike Green.

Absolute Genius - Stater Switch Fix

Invented by Bob Baas

ave you ever had your Model A starter switch stick, like it was welding itself to the starter post, and you had to get out of the car and whack the switch to stop the starter from spinning, fearing a complete melt down



Here we can see the severe heat and hurning caused by the starter's contact when shorted (welded) to the starter contact post.

I've seen an accessory spring fitted between the floorboard and under the pedal top but it didn't work for me.

The starter switch relies on the spring-like ability of the metal contact strip inside the switch housing. It is quite a common situation when these parts decide not to part and you'll find yourself moving at top speed to get the hood up and whack the start switch (if you have a whacker handy).

So, I tried something different. I cut a short piece of 5/16° (OD) rubber fuel hose (think springy) and put it next to the starter contact, then set the starter switch back on.


The rubber hase acts like an insulated tough spring and pushes the switch contact up and away from the starter's copper contact bass when you release your foot pressure.

No sticking, no shorting, no fires, no damages to parts, no unwanted spinning, and it has never stuck again. (CY)




The armature, in this case, was also damaged from the extreme heat that builds up until you can find a way to break the circuit.

This small 5/16" OD rubber fuel hose has completely prevented the contacts from sticking. Bob shows where to place the rubber hose piece just long enough to fit firmly inside the switch housing.



Bob's fex is about as simple as a fix can be, one piece of rubber hose and done. Brilliant!

A WARNING TO ANTIQUE CAR HOBBYISTS ABOUT POTENTIAL ONLINE SCAMMERS

I am writing this warning after being scammed earlier this year as a result of running a want ad on a very popular and reputable car club website. I am a member of several national car clubs and believe that these clubs always try to protect their members from scammers who are constantly looking for ways to steal from members.

Although these scammers use lots of techniques to deceive readers, there are important warning flags telling you to stay clear. If I had paid attention to this list, I would still have my money! Some (but not all) of these are listed below:

- If you really want or need the items or car, do not let your emotions take over your brain!
- If it sounds too good to be true, it almost always is, so use extreme caution!
- If you do not know the person who responds to your ad, or they cannot provide references you know, stay clear.
- If the ad respondent is not a club member, beware!
 Scammers scan websites looking for suckers!
- If you have had good past experiences buying from an ad or website, that is no indication that this new deal is legitimate. I bought a great car from a legitimate seller, then got scammed by a respondent to my new want ad on the same website. Always keep your guard up!
- If the respondent is in a hurry to finalize a deal with you (same day, for example) stop and ask yourself 'Why?' They may tell you the car or parts are headed to the scrap yard that day because they lost their lease or sold their house, among other reasons, Do not be in a hurry!!
- If the respondent can't send you a picture of themselves with the parts, or especially a picture of the car with them holding the legible title, stay away. Insist on seeing a picture of the VIN number stamped on the car and confirm that it matches the title of the car you are seeking.

- If the respondent can't or won't give you their verifiable address, be very careful.
- If the respondent insists on receiving payment through Western Union or MoneyGram, use extreme caution. Both of these legitimate services will ask if you know the individual you are wiring money to. This is to protect you. If you don't know the person, don't send the money.
- If the respondent will not accept a wire transfer to their bank, stay away!
- If the respondent gives you their phone number, try to reverse trace the number. It may end up being a "burner phone."
- If the respondent tells you they will arrange shipping for a car, don't let them! Arrange your own shipment.
- Don't be deceived by scammers who have lots of information about a car and its history. With a little research, scammers' fake news can be very convincing! Be careful.
- If you decide to ignore your instincts or these warnings and the respondent tells you about an add-on deal, it's a sure sign the deal is suspicious. Stay away.

Always talk to trusted friends and advisors about any deal you are contemplating. A third party is much more likely to read a situation for what it is. Had I listened to my friends and advisors, I would not be writing this article today.



Six to 12-Volt DC Converter

For those folks driving a Model A with a 6-volt electrical system, a converter is available that will provide 10 amps of 12-volt DC power to operate a GPS, a back-up camera, or any other 12-volt device, and re-charge a cell phone while rolling down the road. It is small enough to be mounted under the dash rail along with an automotive power output receptacle.

The converter is available on-line from Amazon and is described as a Digiten 6-volt to 12-volt converter with a 10 amp output capacity. The device size is 2.9" X 2.9" X 1.25" and is priced at \$28.99.

There were hats for every occasion, from the most casual golf style hat to go with knickers, to the top hat with formal evening tails. Straw hats for summer were worn with Palm Beach suits. Derbys or fedoras were worn with business suits. For every job there was a work hat. Following are descriptions and examples of men's hats which were used during the Model "A" era.



All Wool:

Hand shaped and hand blocked of fine all wool top coating material. One piece top with warm inband for cold weather. Fancy medium brown plaid and fancy medium gray plaid.



All Wool One-Piece Kersey

One Piece Kersey:

Solid one piece style all wool kersey cloth, satin lined with warm inband and unbreakable visor. Colors: bluish gray and tan.




All Wool:

All wool with a soft nap closely resembles camels hair. Patterns are dressy and refined. Satin lined. Colors: medium gray and medium tan.



Wool and Silk:

About 2/3 wool, balance silk. Full cotton twill lined. Colors: gray and brown.



Collegiate Cap:

Smaller shape 3/4 wool, balance rayon. All around leather sweatband. No inband. Colors: fancy grey and tan.



Adjustable:

Adjust the buckle in front to fit head. Tailored of a swagger plaid material 2/3 wool. Genuine leather sweatband in front, satin lined. Colors: fancy bluish gray plaid, fancy tan plaid.

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
