### Santa Maria CCRG JAMBOREE '23

Spring brings lots of good things, including CCRG. This year, the Jamboree was hosted by the Santa Maria A's in, of all places, Santa Maria. Eighteen Harbor A's members joined the fun. A few folks drove up on Wednesday; the majority of people came up on Thursday. Rob Hernandez drove his Model A all the way, with Janet Winter riding shotgun, as did Mickey and Bea Fruchter. Several others trailered their Model A's and the rest drove their moderns. However they got there, everyone seemed to enjoy the three-day event. One highlight of the drive north was the beauty of the green hills with lots of wildflowers, thanks to the plentiful rain this winter.

On Thursday, before the formal CCRG activities began, 11 of our members participated in a craft lesson at Creation Station in Buellton. Miss Dawn, who had previously led us through how to make pinecone ornaments and photo ornaments, taught us how to make cockades (see photos) which we later learned are actually Model A era appropriate. Our highly successful session was followed by dinner at Chomp in Solvang, an old favorite from summer trips to Solvang. That evening, most of us and many attendees from other clubs visited Mendenhall's Museum of Gasoline Pumps and Petroliana in Buellton.

Friday found the bulk of our group up very early to visit Vandenberg Space Force Base. Participants were divided into two groups for purposes of the tour to keep the size of the groups more manageable. One group drove to the museum on the base, while the other group waited on the parade grounds, and then the groups switched places. The director of the museum was incredibly knowledgeable about the history of the missile programs that have had connections to Vandenberg. When the groups reconvened all together on the parade grounds, there was an opportunity for a great picture of all the Model A's that had made the trip. This group had a nice taco lunch at a local park after the tour. The alternate tour on Friday was a visit to the two missions in the area, Mission La Purisima in Lompoc and Mission Santa Inez in Solvang. This tour ended with lunch on their own in Solvang. Friday night, we were treated to a Santa Maria BBQ dinner provided by the CCRG Board. The meal was delicious, with the strawberry shortcake dessert being a special treat for many of us. You may want to ask to see the video of Jack cutting a rug at the dinner! The Harbor A's ended the night with a rousing game of Left-Center-Right won by Bea Fruchter who walked away with \$48!

Saturday all participants got to sleep in just a little before they went on their tours. One group went to see how strawberries (and some vegetables) are processed at Main Street Cooling to prepare them for their journey on trucks headed for points east, from the Midwest to New York. The tour of the cooling plant taught us a lot about how the fruits and vegetables are cooled as quickly as possible after they leave the field to enable the products to be as fresh as possible after the long journey. The folks on this tour also got to visit a strawberry field and tried their hands at picking berries. Some concluded that, no matter what strawberries cost, it's worth it because it is no easy job to pick them. The other group went on a tour that was billed as the "Music Box Tour," but turned out to be so much more. In addition to music boxes, there were juke boxes, vintage pinball machines, early computer games (think PacMan), and much more. Visitors even got cups of quarters to play the various machines. Both groups met back up at the fabulous home of one of the Santa Maria A's club members for box lunches. The setting was amazing, including a large lawn area to park the Model A's, multiple garages with gas pumps and other automobilia (similar to Mendenhall's), and a car collection including not only Model As but also several Shelbys. Following this full day, the evening brought all together for the closing banquet. A few of our Harbor A's members won prizes in the opportunity drawing, though many of us had to accept that our tickets reflected our donations to the Santa Maria A's.

#### MODEL A YOUTH program

Southern California Regional Occupational Center May 4, 2023

About a year ago, Weeg Thompson suggested we reach out to the Southern California Regional Occupational Center (SCROC) to see if we could bring our cars and do a presentation for Model A Youth month (a first for our club). Here is what developed as a result of her wonderful suggestion and the efforts of Pat Harrison who was able to make a connection through two of their Board Members.

Several of our club members hopped in their cars on May 4 for the short trip to the SCROC in Torrance in recognition of Model A Youth month where we were greeted by 24 students, the automotive class instructor Alan Lee, and the superintendent of SoCal ROC, Dr. Atlas Helaire.

Our program started with an introduction of who we are; why we were there; information about the Model A Youth Restoration Award and our club, Harbor Area Model A Club with an invitation to come to our meetings

President Rob Hernandez shared a brief history about the Model A. Tool Coordinator Bobby DeCrescenzo talked about Henry Ford, how he got started and some of his inventions. He brought several Model A tools, asked students if they knew their purpose, and then explained how they were used.

We had ten Model As, from the working man's models to the luxury models. Students moved from car to car with our members sharing information about their cars: type and year, when and how they were acquired, what they had done mechanically and cosmetically, an interesting story, etc.

We then reconvened for questions and to raffle off three of our club hats. Each student received a laser engraved wooden business card with the club logo, website address, and QR code that would take students directly to our website designed and created by Steve Thompson (they were a huge hit—everyone wanted one!). What a wonderful experience for both the students and members. The students were very attentive and interested, and we were even invited to stay and address the evening class. Hopefully, we created an interest in the Model A and will be seeing some of the students at an upcoming meeting.

We concluded our Model A Youth event by attending the May 8 SoCal Roc Board meeting sharing with the Board Members what an enthusiastic response we received from the school and students to our Model As and all we shared about them.











#### **Technical Article**

#### ASSIGNMENT OF MODEL A PART NUMBERS BY FORD By Charlie Stephens

Assignment of part numbers at Ford was not random but instead was approached in a logical manner. Groups of numbers were assigned according to the parts function. An example of this is that the engine components were assigned numbers from 6000 through 6999 (a complete list of these groups of numbers is contained in the table). Continuing the example within the block of numbers, "6050" was assigned to the cylinder head. This number would continue to define the cylinder head as future parts were identified by new prefixes and suffixes. When later V8's required a different cylinder head for each side of the engine the left head continued to be numbered "6050" while the right head was designated "6049".

The prefix to the number represented the application for which the part was first used. All Model A (1928-1931) part numbers began with "A" for passenger vehicles and "AA" for heavy trucks. When the 1932 vehicles were introduced the part numbers began with "B" for the 4 cylinder and parts common with the V8, with "18" for the parts unique to the V8 and with "BB" for the large trucks. Any Model A parts that were used in the 1932 vehicles were renumbered. An example of this is the valve spring retainer. Part number A-6514 was renumbered to B-6514 and shown in the later Ford part books as being used 1928 through 1934. This part (as well as other renumbered parts) was a functional replacement that may or may not be identical to the original part used in the Model A.

Ford was interested in building "drivers" not "show cars". Current catalogs from Model A parts suppliers may show either part number (or their own number). Any part that was unique to the Model A retained the "A" prefix. This concept is important to the Model A owner because it explains why some Model A parts in the suppliers catalogs carry a "B" prefix while others have an "A" prefix.

The model year 1932 was the last time that Ford would completely renumber all of the parts. In 1933 the prefix was "40" for the passenger car, "46" for the commercial and "BB" for the large trucks. Parts that remained the same from 1932 were not renumbered.

If after the original release of the part a change was made such that the part was not functionally interchangeable, a suffix was added to the part number beginning with "A" and extending through the alphabet. If more than one configuration was required within a given prefix and basic part number it would also receive a different suffix.




